### **Title IX Reporting and Response Visual Aids**

#### **Relevant Rubric Area(s):**

- 1. Prevention (Prevention Program or Toolkits)
- 2. Response (Improved Communication and Increased Transparency)

#### **Description of Work:**

Bucknell is currently participating in NASPA's (Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education) <u>Culture of Respect (Ending Campus Sexual Violence) Core Evaluation program</u>. According to NASPA, "The Culture of Respect Collective is a two-year program that brings together institutions of higher education who are dedicated to ending campus sexual violence and guides them through a rigorous process of self-assessment and targeted organizational change. Each diverse cohort relies on an expert-developed public health framework, cross campus collaboration, and peer-led learning to make meaningful programmatic and policy changes." Through the self-assessment process, we identified the following objectives in alignment with three of the Culture of Respect pillars:

- In the "Clear Policies" category: to create a visual representation of our investigation and hearing procedures;
- In the "Survivor Support" category: to develop a visual depiction of the reporting process; and
- In the "Multitiered Education" category: to implement a primary prevention and awareness campaign

As such, we developed a prevention and awareness campaign that was implemented in the 2023-2024 academic year. This campaign, "Know the IX," primarily focused on providing transparency and clarity around the services provided to support and respond to sexual harassment and interpersonal violence, the visibility of University staff that are available to provide these services, and how we can support victim-survivors of sexual assault. We worked with our campus Marketing Department to develop interactive flow-charts detailing our reporting options and resources. We also displayed visuals on door hangers and placed them on all residential students' dorm doors so the contact information and numbers were easily accessible. As part of "Know the IX," we developed a resource guide for both students and employees that provides a comprehensive overview of the reporting options, support services and resources.

This initiative was aimed at combatting reporting barriers and ensuring a more streamlined response to those reporting concerns. It also assisted the Title IX Coordinator and Associate Director for Interpersonal Violence Prevention & Advocacy in explaining the University's policy

to campus community members. We utilized the flow charts and marketing materials while engaging training and programming across campus, and in meeting with victim-survivors and other campus constituents to highlight clear reporting options, support services and resources.

This initiative additionally aided in providing faculty and staff with toolkits to better support students experiencing inequities or harassment. As mandatory reporters, faculty and staff need to have a baseline knowledge on how to report, and where to refer students who are seeking support and resources.

**Status:** Complete. The materials were completed and utilized during the 2023-2024 academic year.

**Novelty:** The "Know the IX" campaign was new for our institution and we developed it as one way to provide transparency and visibility to student, faculty and staff members on their reporting options, support services and the resources the University offers. We developed our materials utilizing a combination of examples from other institutions and based on what we thought would resonate best with our campus community. Putting door hangers on every residential room door at the beginning of the 2023 fall semester was a novel idea our Associate Director for Interpersonal Violence Prevention and Advocacy thought of and implemented!

**Next Steps:** Pursuant to new Title IX regulations going into effect on August 1, 2024, the visual aids will be updated accordingly to assure we are utilizing the most recent information.

**EMERGENCY** 

- The Interpersonal Violence Prevention & Advocacy Coordinator, Kristin Gibson, is a confidential university resource and is available M-F (570-577-1542) to support victim survivors by listening, believing, and connecting them to resources.
- The Counseling & Student Development Center are also available M-F by appointment (570-577-1604); trauma-informed counselors can provide supportive therapeutic services to assist victim survivors in their recovery.
- The chaplains in Religious & Spiritual Life (570-577-1592) are confidential resources who can offer support and comfort to all students on campus.
- An off-campus resource, Transitions of PA is a local non-profit that offers a 24/7 hotline (1-800-850-7948) that can provide immediate support and advocacy.
- Another off-campus resource, is the National Sexual Assault
   Hotline (1-800-656-4673). Also available 24/7, this hotline is run by
   national organization RAINN. In addition to support, they can also
   direct victim survivors to online resources and forms of support.

# WHEN AND WHERE CAN I SEEK MEDICAL ATTENTION?

IDEALLY AS SOON AS YOU ARE CAPABLE AT THE CLOSEST



### EMERGENCY ROOM

- Even if you do not want to file a police report, it is recommended you seek the following medical attention as soon as possible.
   Although more effective the earlier they are conducted, these services can still be provided 3-5 days after an assault.
- Going to a health care provider allows you to be checked for injuries and discuss concerns related to unintended pregnancy or STIs. Student Health is open for appointments 7 days a week (570-577-1401).
- Additionally, going to a health care provider allows you to consider evidence collection. Called a Sexual Assault Forensic Exam (SAFE), it does not require a commitment to report to the police. These exams are anonymous, free and are available through: Evangelical Hospital, 570-522-2770, 1 Hospital Drive, Lewisburg, PA 17837
- If possible, try not to change clothes, bathe/shower, use the bathroom, or eat/drink prior to seeking medical attention, as these things may destroy evidence of the assault.

APPOINTMENT OF ADVISER If either party does not have an adviser, the Title IX Coordinator will appoint an adviser to fulfill the adviser's

responsibilities during a hearing

PRE-HEARING MEETINGS

The hearing panel chair meets separately

with both parties to review hearing procedures and address questions evidence and investigation report.

The Hearing Panel Chair conducts a

virtual hearing (via Zoom) where all parties, their advisers, and relevant witnesses

participate from private locations.

AND REMEDIES

The hearing panel convene to deliberate, determine responsibility for allegations, and draft a written summary for determination. With finding of responsibility, the hearing panel will recommend sanctions for the Respondent and remedies for the Complainant. With finding of no responsibility, the hearing panel may recommend appropriate remedies for the parties.


NOTICE OF OUTCO NOTICE OF OUTCOME
The hearing panel chair and Title IX
Coordinator share a written notice of
outcome to both parties. The Title IX
Coordinator meets with both parties
to review sanctions and remedies.

SANCTIONS AND REMEDIES
The Title IX Coordinator implements sanctions and remedies.

APPEAL OPTION

Either party may file a request for appeal to the Title IX Coordinator, who forwards appeals to an appellate panel

for determination.



NO APPEAL OPTION FOR INFORMAL RESOLUTION

The Complainant may choose to file a formal complaint at any time.
